



Dear Supporters,

2024 was transformative for Horton's Kids in so many ways. The start of our fiscal year coincides with the start of the school year and for us back-to-school is always busy and exciting! We continued to settle into our new building, the Horton's Kids Community Resource Hub, also known as "The Hub." The Hub has become the central point in a hub-and-spoke model serving children and families in Ward 8. With this third center, in close proximity to our Community Resource Centers in Wellington Park and Stanton Oaks, Horton's Kids deepened our commitment to the Anacostia community we know and love. The Hub is located within ½ mile of an additional 16 affordable housing developments and in 2024, 54 additional children and their families living within the newly expanded footprint began participating in programs.

The Hub now serves as our headquarters. This has made Horton's Kids a true Southeast DC nonprofit and demonstrates our long-term commitment to the community. Consolidating our headquarters and programmatic operations saves the organization valuable resources and creates greater efficiency. It has allowed us to deepen our community and family engagement work, bringing resources that last mile so they can be accessed more readily by families.

Just after celebrating our one-year anniversary in our new space, in March 2024 we were thrilled to be awarded a \$2 million grant through the Yield Giving Open Call from philanthropist Mackenzie Scott. Thanks to that grant and support from more than 220 additional donors, we were thrilled to close out our \$5 million Securing Futures Southeast capital campaign and even more excited to be able to confidently plan for the years ahead.


We closed our fiscal year 2024 with a record-breaking 5-week Summer Fest. We served 175 youth, PreK through 9th grade, preventing learning loss as 88% of our participants either grew or maintained their reading level and 80% grew or maintained their math levels. This is significant as "summer slide" typically results in students losing up to three months of learning.

None of our 2024 achievements would be possible without our funding partners, individual and corporate supporters, HK volunteers, neighbors, and caregivers. Thank you for all you do to ensure we're here and able to serve.

Pillar 1

EducationalAttainment



Looking back on 2024, Horton's Kids is proud of the strides we made in advancing educational attainment for participants in our programs. Both our after-school tutoring and full-day Summer Fest camp programs had record enrollment in 2024, expanding access to high-quality learning opportunities throughout the year.

In 2024, we launched a formal math tutoring program and our STEAM enrichment programs flourished, sparking creativity and critical thinking in students across all grade levels. Through a partnership with *Girls Who Code*, elementary and middle school participants gained exposure to computer coding and programming, even learning about app development through a mock app development and funding round. Two middle school participants, Chasity and Kyleigh, planned to create an app called "Candy" a social media platform made for people with social anxiety. We are honored to support the next generation of thoughtful innovators.

We launched a new PreK program providing early literacy and math interventions, expanding educational opportunities from our youngest learners through older youth.

Alayjha Scott, participated in our inaugural summer internship program in 2022, and received a *Brenda Chamberlain scholarship* in Fall 2024 to continue her studies at Virginia Commonwealth University. She graduated in December 2024 with a psychology degree and plans to explore her medical school ambitions.

Horton's Kids taught me to take chances because you never know what might come from it. They also taught me how to ask for help when needed because it is important to use all the resources you can get. Overall, they showed me how to be more open to new ideas and opportunities.





We also expanded career-focused initiatives, including internships, college tours, career speakers, and job fairs that connected students with real-world opportunities. These experiences provided valuable exposure to various career paths.

For our alumni, 2024 saw growth in in our scholarship fund, enabling more young people to pursue higher education. As we reflect on the year, we are excited to see the impact of our efforts in shaping brighter, more equitable futures for youth involved with Horton's Kids.

Pillar 2

Family Stability

In 2024, Horton's Kids remained deepy committed to fostering family stability by offering resources and support that promote family cohesion and well-being. We focused on helping families build the foundation for self-sufficiency and long-term resilience. Our parent education programs provide essential tools to caregivers that enhanced their children's academic and personal development.

Financial stability and entrepreneurship took center stage with certificate-based workshops through our **THRIVE** cohorts, allowing parents and caregivers to learn from experts and deepen connections with others participating in the group. Community input guided the cohorts, where families gained the knowledge and confidence to make informed decisions about budgeting, saving, and planning for the future.

In 2024, we expanded access to our Family Essentials and Food Pantry, ensuring that no family went without basic resources. Additionally, our Resource Roundtables provided a vital connection to local community services, helping families access housing, education, healthcare, and more.









Pillar 3

Safety & Belonging



2024 marked a year of transformation for Horton's Kids as we prioritized not only reducing violence but also cultivating spaces where families and youth could feel a true sense of belonging. Our work centered around the understanding that safety is not just about physical protection but also about creating environments where people feel seen, supported, valued, and connected.

By partnering with restorative justice providers, we shifted the focus away from a traditionally punitive paradigm and toward reconciliation and growth. These efforts provided opportunities for healing, accountability, and the rebuilding of trust within the community. At the same time, our violence prevention advocacy allowed youth and families to actively participate in changing the narrative around violence and safety.

The voices of those we serve were critical to our success this year. Both the Parent Advisory Council and Youth Advisory Council helped us refine our programs, ensuring they aligned with the evolving needs of youth and families.

One of our Youth Advisory Council members Ali Erby reflects on the impact he can make and says, "They make me feel like I have a big voice to change my community". We also debuted three new podcasts as part of the HK podcast network to elevate those community voices:

- Our *Planting Seeds* podcast leverages resources and information from partners, including those at our Resource Roundtables, to share with the broader community.
- The Rap Sessions podcast provides a platform for HK alumni and community members, community organizers and leaders to share their life experiences and journeys.
- Our first youth-led podcast HK Confessions hosted by three of our high school participants allows them to develop and research show topics, conduct interviews, and learn about podcast production and promotion.conduct interviews, and learn about podcast production and promotion.

Together these initiatives helped build spaces where safety is felt in every interaction, and everyone has a place to belong.



Yield Giving Grant

In March 2024, Horton's Kids was one of 250 community-based organizations across the US awarded a grant through the Yield Giving Open Call process funded by philanthropist McKenzie Scott. Horton's Kids used the \$2M grant award to create a \$1M fund for organizational stability and financial reserves, and a \$1M Opportunity Fund to support program expansion, technology, impact research, and incentives for staff and participants. A portion of the funds also helped close out our Securing Futures for Southeast capital campaign to create Horton's Hub.
